OTHER GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

While you must earn all credits in your chosen diploma option to earn your high school diploma, you are also required to meet additional graduation requirements, which are listed below.

- 1. You must have a 2.0 GPA (unweighted), C average, to earn your high school diploma.
- 2. You must earn a 3 or higher on the Grade 10 Florida Standard Assessment English Language Arts Exam (FSA ELA). If you do not pass this exam, you can take an SAT or ACT exam to meet this requirement with a concordant score. The required test scores are below:

SAT Evidence-Based Reading & Writing (EBRW)	480
ACT English and Reading Subtests	18*

3. You must earn a 3 or higher on the Algebra 1 End of Course Exam (EOC). If you do not pass this exam you can take the PSAT/NMSQT, SAT or ACT exam to meet this requirement with a concordant score. The required test scores are below:

- 4. The 24 Credit Diploma also requires that at least one course must be completed through online learning. The options for meeting this requirement include:
 - An online course taken in grades 6-12

 - \Rightarrow Daytona State College
 - \Rightarrow Florida Virtual School
 - Completion of a blended learning course

Standard Diploma Requirements Academic Advisement – What Students and Parents Need to Know

What are the diploma options?

Students must successfully complete one of the following diploma options:

- 24-credit standard diploma
- 18-credit Academically Challenging Curriculum to Enhance Learning (ACCEL)
- Career and Technical Education (CTE) Pathway
- Advanced International Certificate of Education
 (AICE) curriculum
- International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma curriculum

What are the state assessment requirements?

Students must pass the following statewide assessments:

- Grade 10 English Language Arts (ELA) or a concordant score
- Algebra 1 end of course (EOC) or a comparative score

Refer to <u>Graduation Requirements for Florida's</u> <u>Statewide Assessments</u> for concordant and comparative scores.

Students enrolled in the following courses must participate in the corresponding EOC assessment, which constitutes 30 percent of the final course grade⁺:

- Algebra 1
 Geometry
- Biology 1
 U.S. History

⁺Special note: Thirty percent not applicable if not enrolled in the course but passed the EOC (credit acceleration program [CAP]).

What is the difference between the 18-credit ACCEL option and the 24-credit option?

- 3 elective credits instead of 8
- Physical Education is not required
- Online course is not required

What is the difference between the CTE Pathway option and the 24-credit option?

- At least 18 credits are required
- 4 elective credits instead of 8
 - 2 credits in CTE courses, must result in completion and industry certification
 - 2 credits in work-based learning programs or up to 2 elective credits including financial literacy
- Physical Education is not required
- Fine and Performing Arts, Speech and Debate, or Practical Arts is not required
- Online course is not required

Students must earn a 2.0 grade point average (GPA) on a 4.0 scale for all cohort years **and pass statewide**, standardized assessments unless a waiver of assessment results is granted by the IEP team for students with disabilities.

* Eligible courses are specified in the <u>Florida Course</u> <u>Code Directory</u>.

**A computer science credit may not be used to substitute for both a mathematics and science credit.

Scholar Diploma Designation

In addition to the requirements of section (s.) <u>1003.4282</u>, Florida Statutes (F.S.), a student must satisfy the following requirements (per. s. <u>1003.4285</u>, F.S.):

- Earn 1 credit in Algebra 2 or an equally rigorous course
- Pass the Geometry EOC
- Earn 1 credit in Statistics or an equally rigorous mathematics course
- Pass the Biology 1 EOC*
- Earn 1 credit in Chemistry or Physics
- Earn 1 credit in a course equally rigorous to Chemistry or Physics
- Pass the U.S. History EOC*
- Earn 2 credits in the same World Language
- Earn at least 1 credit in an AP, IB, AICE or a dual enrollment course

*A student is exempt from the Biology 1 or U.S. History EOC assessment if the student is enrolled in an AP, IB or AICE Biology 1 or U.S. History course; takes the respective AP, IB or AICE assessment; and earns the minimum score to earn college credit.

Merit Diploma Designation

- Meet the standard high school diploma requirements
- Attain one or more <u>industry certifications</u> from the list established (per s. 1003.492, F.S.)

What are the additional graduation options for students with disabilities ?

Two additional options are available only to students with disabilities. Both allow students to substitute a CTE course with related content for one credit in ELA 4, mathematics, science and social studies (excluding Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology 1 and U.S. History). The two options are as follows:

- Students with significant cognitive disabilities may earn credits via access courses and be assessed via an alternate assessment.
- Students who choose the academic and employment option must earn at least 0.5 credit via paid employment.

State University System (SUS)

Admission into Florida's public universities is competitive. Prospective students should complete a rigorous course of study in high school and apply to more than one university to increase their chance for acceptance. To qualify to enter one of Florida's public universities, a first-time-in-college student must meet the following minimum requirements (credit earned by industry certification does not count for SUS admission):

- High school graduation with a standard diploma, a minimum of a 2.5 GPA, and admission test scores meeting minimum college-ready test scores per Board of Governors (BOG) Regulation 6.008
- 16 credits of approved college preparatory academic courses per BOG Regulation 6.002
- 4 English (3 with substantial writing)
- 4 Mathematics (Algebra 1 level and above)
- 3 Natural Science (2 with substantial lab)
- 3 Social Science
- 2 World Language (sequential, in the same language or other equivalents)
- 2 approved electives

State University System of Florida

The Florida College System

The 28 colleges of the Florida College System serve nearly 800,000 students. Colleges offer affordable and stackable workforce credentials including certificate programs, associate in science degrees and associate in arts degrees, which transfer to a bachelor's degree program. Many colleges also offer workforce bachelor's degree programs in areas of high demand. All Florida College System institutions have opendoor admissions for students who earned a standard high school diploma or an equivalent diploma or successfully earned college credit.

Florida College System

Career and Technical Colleges and Centers

Florida also offers students 49 accredited career and technical colleges or centers throughout the state, which provide the education and certification necessary to work in a particular career or technical field. Programs are flexible for students and provide industry-specific education and training for a wide variety of occupations.

All families are encouraged to apply for social benefits if they believe they may qualify for services of any kind.




- ⇒ Use a **personal email** that you know how to log into from any device.

- ⇒ Print your admissions ticket! You will need it and a photo ID to enter on test day.
- ⇒ STUDY! Use the online resources available to study for FREE and take advantage of any study groups offered through the year.
- ⇒ Florida Bright Futures Program will evaluate scores through **JUNE SR year**. *The July ACT will not count*.
- ⇒ Florida Bright Futures and MANY schools will accept SUPER-Scores for both tests.


THE SAT VS THE ACT





Campus Visits & College Reps

Throughout the schools year there will be opportunities to meet with various College Representatives as they schedule time on campus. Listen to announcements and visit Student Services to check dates.

Visiting the campus of schools that you are interested in is highly recommended. Contact the school or go online to see if there are special visitation days planned or to schedule a tour. While visiting a campus you should be prepared with a list of questions and try to plan specific activities, such as:

- Meet with an admissions counselor
- Discuss programs and admissions requirements
- Determine costs and ask about financial aid opportunities
- View dorms, cafeteria, library, athletic centers, etc.
- Meet with faculty in the department of your intended major
- Talk with students and try to attend a class, if available

APPLYING TO COLLEGE

Online applications are the standard for today's schools. Most schools offer the option to apply direct through their website, or many also accept a general application through sites like Common App.

Depending on the school(s) that you are planning to apply to, it may be easier to apply direct. Be sure to check the option for each school on your list and do not hesitate to ask for help from your Counselor, the College & Career Counselor or the Resource Room.

⇒ **Pay attention to deadlines!** Each school will have its own deadlines for:

- Early Admissions
- Regular Admissions
- Financial Aid & Scholarships
- Special Programs
- Housing
- ⇒ Complete the "**Student Records Release Authorization**" form to allow your transcripts to be sent.
- \Rightarrow Take or retake the ACT/SAT and include the school(s) you are applying to when sending scores.
- ⇒ Application fee waivers are available to students who have current Free/Reduced Lunch status and College Board includes (4) free waivers through your account for any student who has taken the SAT using a fee waiver. Not sure if you qualify? Apply online at www.MySchoolApps.com
- ⇒ Academic Resume, Letters of Recommendation, Personal Statement, Application Essay...are just a few items you may need to complete your application.

APPLYING TO COLLEGE (CONT'D)

- \Rightarrow There are (3) websites that can be used to apply to several schools at once:
 - Common App www.CommonApp.org

 - HBCU Common App www.CommonBlackCollegeApp.com
 - Please keep in mind that each school may still require additional information to be submitted through their student portal after your main "general" application is submitted. Be sure to check your application dashboard often to stay on top of requested items.
- \Rightarrow Some schools will require the SSAR in place of a current transcript.
 - The "Self-reported Student Academic Record" is a website that is used to create an account and enter in all of your academic classes that you have taken for high school credit.
 - Access the website https://ssar.selfreportedtranscript.com
- \Rightarrow **Complete your FAFSA** as soon as possible after October 1st!
 - The FAFSA is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and every school will want your FAFSA as part of your evaluation for scholarships, grants and some programs they may offer.
- ⇒ Some schools will require the CSS Profile in addition to the FAFSA.
 - The CSS is part of College Board and is a financial profile that only some schools require.
 - Access the CSS on www.CollegeBoard.org
- \Rightarrow **Recommendation Letters** may be required by some schools.
 - Ask your recommenders in advance do not wait until the day before a deadline!
 - Provide your academic resume or a "brag sheet" to help your recommender.
 - Waiving your **FERPA Rights** when applying to a school means that you waive the right to review any recommendation letters submitted on your behalf.
- ⇒ Your GPA matters! Many schools, programs and scholarships have minimum requirements.
- ⇒ Community Service Hours are not a graduation requirement, but ARE required for some programs and many scholarships, including Bright Futures.
- ⇒ Create a professional email to use when applying to and communicating with colleges, scholarships and job opportunities.

Estimated costs for items such as Transportation and Other Expenses are not "billable" costs, meaning these are items paid directly by the student and include things such as gas, car insurance, personal care items and entertainment expenses.

Financial Aid

Each school will have it's own available financial aid which can include scholarships, grants and work study programs. Be sure to check each school's website for specific information, and when in doubt call the Financial Aid Office to ask your questions!

Don't rule out being able to attend a particular school until you have received your acceptance letter and a detailed financial aid package. Many times what may seem to be an expensive school ends up being the most affordable after the package they offer!

FINANCIAL AID

There are (4) levels of financial aid to help fund education/training after high school:

- 1. Federal may be used anywhere in the USA at any school that is allowed funding
- 2. State may be used at all Public and most Private schools in Florida
- 3. Institution offered by the school applied to and able to be used at that school only
- 4. Private all other scholarships, grants and loans that are applied for
 - National, State and Local scholarships/grants
 - Private loans offered through banks and organizations

Deadlines are VERY important!

- Knowing and following all deadlines for applications is the first step in helping to secure as much aid as possible. Staying organized is key!
- Federal and State applications open October 1st
- Institutional aid can only be applied for after the application for admissions is submitted and in many cases, only after student is accepted for admissions.
- Private scholarships and grants will all have their own application requirements and deadlines and often the earlier the application is received, the better the likelihood of receiving funds.

Local (and some State & National) Scholarships will be advertised on the daily announcements, posted to the Mainland website and posted in Student services. *Don't hesitate to ask questions or apply!*

Good to know:

- FAFSA offers grants, loans and work-study. Maximum Pell Grant for 2022-23 is \$6,895/yr
- State offers scholarships and grants and several are need based.
- First Generation Students may qualify for additional aid from the State and Institution.

MILITARY OPTIONS

There are many opportunities for students who join one of the branches of the armed services upon graduation. Recruiters for each branch visit campus regularly during lunch and contact information for each is available in the Resource Room.

Students interested in the military will need to earn a regular high school diploma to be considered by most, if not all, of the services. Each branch of service offers different opportunities that you may want to ask about, including:

- Opportunities for further education
- Scholarship opportunities
- Career training, jobs and your choices
- Time commitment and options
- Expected income and military lifestyle (travel, station location, etc.)

The ASVAB is required for any student considering a military career.

Next ASVAB CEP is scheduled on **November 17, 2022** (additional test will be offered in March 2023)

ASVAB CEP

The ASVAB CEP is open to all students in 10th-12th grade. Scores may be withheld from the military if a student chooses by completing the "Opt-Out" letter prior to the scheduled assessment date.

There is absolutely NO obligation to enter the military or speak with a recruiter.

The ASVAB is an excellent tool to help you find your strengths and interests and after the test, it unlocks an online resource for (2)yrs that you can use to explore career paths, colleges, military branches, job outlooks and much more. Brochures and additional information available in the Resource Room and on the Mainland website.



CAREER CHOICES

There are options other than a traditional 2yr/4yr degree program after graduation.

- ⇒ Technical and Vocational schools and programs teach students to do very specific jobs, like plumbing, electrical or mechanic work. Daytona State College has several programs available that take less than 2yrs and many just a few months.
- ⇒ The **ASVAB CEP** is an excellent tool to help navigate interests and skills to determine possible career paths other than standard bachelor or associate degree programs.
- ⇒ Some companies offer apprenticeship opportunities where you "earn as you learn".
- ⇒ The Military offers many opportunities for training and jobs that will equip a student even after their service commitment is over.

STUDENT ATHLETES

Students who are planning to or are interested in playing organized sports in college will need to **know the guidelines required** by each school as well as the NCAA or NAIA organizations.

Your GPA does matter! Remember, you are a STUDENT first and an ATHLETE second!

Talk with your high school coaches. Let them know what you are interested in pursuing and ask for their help. Speak with your school counselor to find out the steps needed to send your information to the schools that you are interested in or who have contacted you.


Complete the required "Student Records Release Authorization" to allow your transcripts to be sent.

Take or retake the ACT and/or SAT. Scores are required by most schools as well as the NCAA/NAIA. Students who qualify for ACT/SAT test waivers are eligible to also have their registration fee waived for the NCAA/NAIA account.

If you want to play sports at an NCAA Division I or II school, start by registering for a Certification Account with the NCAA Eligibility Center at **eligibilitycenter.org**. If you want to play Division III sports or you aren't sure where you want to compete, start by creating a Profile Page at **eligibilitycenter.org**.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

To play sports at a Division I or II school, you must graduate from high school, complete 16 NCAA-approved core courses, earn a minimum GPA and earn an ACT or SAT score that matches your core-course GPA.

CORE COURSES

Only courses that appear on your high school's list of NCAA core courses will count toward the 16 core-course requirement; visit **eligibilitycenter.org/courselist** for a full list of your high school's approved core courses. Complete 16 core courses in the following areas:

DIVISION I

Complete 10 NCAA core courses, including seven in English, math or natural/physical science, before your seventh semester.



GRADE-POINT AVERAGE

The NCAA Eligibility Center calculates your grade-point average based only on the grades you earn in NCAA-approved core courses.

- DI requires a minimum 2.3 GPA.
- DII requires a minimum 2.2 GPA.

SLIDING SCALE

Divisions I and II use sliding scales to match test scores and GPAs to determine eligibility. The sliding scale balances your test score with your GPA. If you have a low test score, you need a higher GPA to be eligible. Find more information about test scores at **ncaa.org/test-scores**.

TEST SCORES

You may take the SAT or ACT an unlimited number of times before you enroll full time in college. Every time you register for the SAT or ACT, use the NCAA Eligibility Center code 9999 to send your scores directly to us from the testing agency. We accept official scores only from the ACT or SAT, and won't use scores shown on your high school transcript. If you take either test more than once, the best subscore from different tests are used to give you the best possible score.

NAIA Eligibility Center

More than 30,000 students register each year to become eligible to play college athletics.

Exposure & National Visibility

Since opening in 2010, the NAIA Eligibility Center has had hundreds of thousands students register online providing unprecedented visibility and awareness of the opportunities to play intercollegiate sports at NAIA institutions. The exposure gained from partnerships with major testing services and the nation's more than 20,000 high schools has allowed the center to become a platform for reaching high school student-athletes, their families and coaches on a national scale.

Level Playing Field

NAIA rules help ensure that NAIA student-athletes compete against students with similar levels of training and competitive experience. The NAIA Eligibility Center reviews the experiences of athletes who have competed outside the traditional college setting to maintain a level playing field throughout NAIA competition. Coaches know that the rules are applied consistently to every student, every time.

The NAIA Eligibility Center provides initial eligibility determinations, working with integrity to apply NAIA rules and provide quality customer service for students, parents and NAIA membership.

Focus on the Student-Athlete & Customer Service

- With NAIA rules, prospective students don't have to worry about navigating a complex web of eligibility and recruiting contact rules. High school students have three academic eligibility criteria to focus on. If a student meets two of the criteria, then the student is eligible upon high school graduation:
 - Cumulative GPA of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale
 - Class rank in top 50% of graduating class
 - If no class rank is on the transcript, nine college credits can be used in place of this requirement. (Effective May 1, 2020.)
 - ACT of 18 or SAT of 970 Critical Reading and Math*
- Registering with the NAIA Eligibility Center is required for all first-time NAIA student-athletes. It only takes a few minutes to register.
- High academic performers in high school can even receive a final eligibility determination before high school graduation, if they meet a higher GPA

standard and have qualifying test scores. THE NAIA ELIGIBILITY CENTER

- The fee to register is \$90 for students coming directly from high school, \$135 for transfer students, and \$150 for international students. For U.S. students with demonstrated need, a fee waiver system is in place.
- The PlayNAIA.org website is where all work related to the NAIA Eligibility Center for students, NAIA members, and high school counselors takes place. Students can track their progress online or through their mobile phones. NAIA coaches can easily monitor recruits through the registration process through their school's PlayNAIA dashboard.
